

# **Afghan Emergency**

Thousands of refugees from Afghanistan will need to be housed and integrated into our national life over the next few years. Talks are taking place with councils up and down the country seeking commitments of accommodation and support. The Epsom and Ewell Refugee Network (ERN) is in talks with our Borough Council to try and help them be part of this scheme. If you would like to encourage them to take part, please write to your local Councillor.

ERN are urgently looking for local landlords who will rent properties to refugee families under the Afghan Resettlement Scheme. Please encourage any landlords you know to get in touch, even if their property is not currently vacant. Jo Sherring of ERN, who rents two properties to refugees, can explain how it works, to the good of all.

If you know anyone who speaks an Afghan language, please encourage him/her to contact ERN.

Please look out any clothes, shoes, phones or other essentials that you might like to donate to <u>Care4Calais</u>, who are collecting in anticipation of a huge influx from Afghanistan. If you bring them to church or to the Parish Office, I will see that they reach the distribution hub in Ashford. Thank you.

### **SECOND READING**

James 2:1-10 [11-13] 14-17

A reading from the letter of James. My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favouritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? But you have dishonoured the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you? You do well if you really fulfil the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. [For the one who said, "You shall not commit adultery," also said, "You shall not murder." Now if you do not commit adultery but if you murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. So speak and so act as those who are to be judged by the law of liberty. For judgement will be without mercy to anyone who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgement.] What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

### GOSPEL Mark 7:24-37

Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile. of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go - the demon has left your daughter." So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone. Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."

# Illustration

Most of us take our five senses for granted. We cannot remember what it is like to be without the forms of communication which we learned so early on. Going abroad and being unable to speak the language returns us to our infantile state as we struggle to make ourselves understood. We again become vulnerable and exhausted with our efforts and understand better the trials experienced by those living with disability.

But God's miracles extend into our scientific age to assist those more permanently disabled by their sensual loss. For example, there are now cochlear implants which allow some deaf people to hear through a series of electronic impulses. There is the possibility that one day retina implants will enable those blind from birth to see, even if only for a short time: time to see their loved ones' faces and some of the wonders of which they have only heard.

God's miracles are all around us: gifts that delight us and guide us towards a greater understanding of his love. This reassurance frees us to become more fully the people he made, whether or not our bodies or minds are physically complete.

# **Gospel Teaching**

During Jesus' ministry the miracles he performed always pointed beyond themselves. At a straightforward level he heals. Not just by what he says but by what he does. He is not afraid to touch people and puts his fingers in the man's ears, touching his tongue with his own spittle. He gives of himself, physically and in terms of concentration and energy, and, as a result, the man discovers the freedom of hearing and speech.

At another level this process illustrates the concern which Jesus has to free the hearing and speech of all who listen to him, whether or not they experience disability, including us today. It is only when we hear him clearly that we can, in turn, live out and proclaim the truth of his message.

Some people are disabled by poverty or by discrimination against outsiders or foreigners, like the Syrophoenician woman, alien to Jewish culture. But yet it was she who recognised Jesus' true status. When she challenged him with her depth of faith he realised that his ministry was for all people. Both she and the deaf man were completely open to Jesus, vulnerable in their total faith. Unlike the cynical, well-informed Pharisees, they did not presume they had the answers to life's questions.

We are sometimes hampered by our complicated knowledge: it can blind and deafen us. True wisdom is being conscious of what we do not know and remaining open to being taught. Jesus works hard to clarify our hearing and our sight, our understanding and our insight, so that with or without perfect physical senses our discipleship is of the best, God's truth is heard and God's will is done.

# **Application**

Deafness and blindness are not necessarily physical conditions. The scribes were deaf to the full meaning of Jesus' teaching while hearing his words perfectly. Some of Jesus' disciples were blind to events which seem obvious to us in retrospect.

We are more likely to develop our sense of God and his working through us if we can recognise how deaf to his word we can become. When people believe they have all the answers, a monopoly of the truth, there is a danger that they reinforce their blindness and inability to hear.

Jesus will free us today, just as he freed the deaf man in the Gospel, when we are open and vulnerable, available to be approached and do not assume that we know everything. Jesus told us that to love God well we must become like little children; not childish, but childlike. With their ability to trust implicitly, children listen with open ears and see with unclouded vision.

And when we recognise our poverty, our littleness and our need for God, Jesus can work in us: to heal us in all our disabilities, to include us despite our differences and foreignness, and to teach us what we need to know in order to hear the word and act upon it.

These gifts are given to those who ask. This is how the kingdom of God is extended upon earth – by disciples attentive to their master. We are those disciples and Christ's Church relies upon our wisdom, insight and vision.

We hear the promises Jesus gives about his kingdom: the needs of those who experience poverty and hunger are met, and weeping gives way to laughter. And if we want to be part of that kingdom we can learn how to live according to its values, but that's quite a challenge.

On Thursday let's try reading each of the verses slowly, several times, then pause and reflect on what it would be like to follow each commandment fully. Then on Friday we could read back over those verses and reflect, honestly, on how we need to change and grow to become more mature "children of the Most High".

On Saturday let's look back over the week, read again the Kingdom's Manifesto and resolve to check the foundations on which we are living our lives. Is there too much sand or are we already living on a good, strong and solid rock?

# THE THEOLOGY OF ST PAUL

# PART III – THE LETTERS OF PAUL

Becky Mynett continues her series about the life and theology of St Paul.

Paul's letters were written to specific groups of people for specific reasons. Usually he was writing in response to news about some sort of problem within an early Christian community. He did not intend to write either scripture or a theological treatise. As a result, reading Paul's letters is like reading someone else's post or listening to one end of a telephone conversation – we sometimes have to think carefully in order to work out what is going on. We also have to remember that Paul lived in a society that in many ways was very different from our own.

So what can we learn about Paul's theology from his letters?

Firstly, his understanding of God and Jesus was based on his experience of meeting the risen Christ. Having been a persecutor of the Church, he became convinced that Jesus had been sent by God. As a Pharisee, Paul already believed that when God rescued Israel

from bondage, the dead would be resurrected. He saw Jesus' resurrection as proof that he was from God and he expected Jesus to return soon to raise all who were faithful to God. In 1 Corinthians he explains that everyone, whether still alive or already dead, would have a new spiritual body. In his earlier letters, especially 1Thessalonians, Paul clearly assumes that this will happen in his lifetime.

Secondly, we learn that there was a controversy about how Gentiles should follow Jesus. Did they need to become Jewish, be circumcised and obey the Law? In Galatians, Paul is clear that this is not necessary.


Faith in Jesus (rather than aherence to the Law) puts you right with God and enables you to participate in the resurrection of the dead. As Christians, Jews and Gentiles are equals and the whole Law is summed up in loving your neighbour as yourself.

Although Paul did not set out to write theology, his most theological letter is that to the Romans, and we will look at that next week.

# Part of the family

Richard Greatrex reflects on James 2:1-10 [11-13] 14-17 and Mark 7:24-end

ne of the Bible's major themes courses through all of today's readings, regarding the treatment by the rest of society of those deemed poor, sick, outcast and alien. Scripture resounds with the belief that God stands in solidarity with those who are broken, lost and lonely, yet the author of the letter of James still needs to upbraid fellow Christians for their failure to put this into practice. Their faith is lacking if it does not lead them to follow God's way, to act mercifully.

Turning to the Gospel it initially looks as if Jesus may have fallen into the same mindset. Travelling into Gentile territory for a break from demanding Galilean crowds, he finds his popularity has preceded him. When a Syrophoenician woman begs him to help her possessed daughter, he tartly reminds her that his mission is firstly to Israel. But when her response uses his own language against him, Jesus graciously admits the validity of her argument. Declaring her daughter healed, he treats this Gentile woman as his equal, enacting God's preference for those who are marginalised. Both he and the woman need to cross boundaries created by religion, ethnicity and gender, to do what is right.

Today we are called to overcome many of those self-same barriers to keep building Church as a holy kingdom where all are welcome as equal members of God's family.

God of mercy, teach us to see you in each other; embolden us to tear down barriers which create misunderstanding, distrust and despair. Give us grace to admit our mistakes and courage to embrace all as equal in your sight. Amen.

The New Testament contains traditionally thirteen letters thought to have been written by Paul. Biblical scholars agree that he definitely wrote seven of them. These are the earliest surviving Christian scriptures and pre-date the Gospels. The first, 1 Thessalonians, was probably written in around AD 50 and the last, Romans, about eight years

later. Between these, Paul wrote to the churches in Galatia, Corinth and Philippi, and to Philemon.

As for the rest, scholars disagree whether they were written by Paul or later followers, although the vast majority think it unlikely he wrote the letters to Timothy and Titus. It is now thought they were written after his death in around AD 64, and the same goes for Ephesians, 2 Thessalonians and Colossians.

It was common for letters to be written in the name of a respected teacher, so we should not think of them as forgeries. And of course, although they may not have been written by Paul, they are still valuable early Christian documents. 🥯

Let us then pursue what makes for peace and for mutual upbuilding."


