

Contemplative Prayer Group

The Group meets in the Lady Chapel in St Martin's on Tuesday, 5th August at 11 am. Anyone is very welcome who would like an hour or so of quiet meditation and silence. Our starting point will be Isaiah 27.2,5: 'A pleasant vineyard let it make peace with me'.

Second Thoughts – Sunday, August 10th at 6.30pm Refreshments from 6pm David Stamp - 'A career at Reuters news agency'

What is a news agency, and how does it differ from - but work with - the news media we're more familiar with such as newspapers, TV and radio?

Reuters has a 170-year history which began - with the help of some carrier pigeons - by conveying stock market prices. The news came later after Baron Reuter, a German, set up shop in London. And a competitive business it was, with Reuters news agency scoring a scoop with the first news in Britain of Abraham Lincoln's assassination.

Reuters has worked through wars and peace, good economic times and crises, guarding its reputation for balanced reporting and freedom from state influence. In the 1980s it boomed by supplying news and data to financial markets, as well as traditional media.

Now it is adapting to a rapidly changing world where sifting truth from untruth is harder than ever. Journalists face a host of new ethical questions to add to those they have always grappled with. How do reporters ensure balance in their work, how do they protect their sources of information from threatening governments and other powerful forces, and how do they protect themselves when working in war zones?

Biographical note:

David joined Reuters as a trainee journalist in 1981 and worked for the company for 37 years before retiring. Among the places he was posted to were Hong Kong, New Zealand, Vienna, Prague and Amsterdam.

He covered events including the dying days of communism in central and Eastern Europe, the end of the war in Bosnia, chaos in Egypt after the fall of Hosni Mubarak, and the Greek economic crisis. Interviews included with Kofi Annan, Chris Patten and Robert Mugabe.

THE POWER OF POETRY - JULY

It is summer, so as a change from more serious poetry, I have chosen a lighter one by John Betjeman (1906-1984).

I expect many of you will remember him from the sixties and seventies when he was frequently on television, though he was a prolific broadcaster from the thirties. He became Poet Laureate in 1972, and was a rarity among poets for being commercially successful and popular (except with the people of Slough perhaps).

He is renowned for his dislike of modern architecture, particularly when it involved sweeping away something more beautiful or interesting. He was instrumental in saving St Pancras Station but he was equally keen to record his horror of the modern taste for removal of high-backed oak settles or stuffed fish in glass cases from pubs, or for the increase in identical poorly-built houses disfiguring the landscape – he had an acute eye also for the people who inhabited them. (See too *Hymn* "The Church's Restoration in 1883 has left for contemplation not what there used to be..."). He appreciated landscape of all sorts, writing the Shell Guides with artist John Piper. He wrote poems about Cornwall, the suburbs, Margate, Ireland, Henley-on-Thames, Essex and many other places.

I suppose the ability to notice, to absorb and then to set down those impressions in apposite words which convey not just the appearance but the scents and sounds, and intangibles, of a place is an indication of a poet rather than an ordinary observer. For instance:

Trebertheric

We used to picnic where the thrift Grew deep and tufted to the edge; We saw the yellow foam-flakes drift In trembling sponges on the ledge.

Upper Lambourne

Up the ash tree climbs the ivy, Up the ivy climbs the sun, With a twenty-thousand pattering Has a valley breeze begun. Feathery ash, neglected elder, Shift the shade and make it run.

Croydon

The laurels are speckled in Marchmont Avenue Just as they were before;
But the steps are dusty that still lead up to Your Uncle Dick's front door.

Betjeman is also a poet of things ecclesiastical, including the church buildings themselves, but this is a topic for another day.

The poem selected is *East Anglian Bathe*. Anyone who as a child holidayed on the coast of Britain before the advent of package holidays will probably recall similar scenes – the 'bent grass on the leeside', the 'tumbled breaker-line', or as they paddled the 'intersecting wavelets morning cold'. Our memories may not be so poetic, but I'm sure we can relate to his. I remember sheltering behind a Brighton breakwater from the cold wind, eating a faintly gritty sandwich (perhaps the true origin of the word <u>sand</u>wich, and

not the eponymous Lord after all!), the iciness of the water, the sharpness of the shingle..... Anyway, here is the poem:

Oh when the early morning at the seaside
Took us with hurrying steps from Horsey Mere
To see the whistling bent-grass on the leeside
And then the tumbled breaker-line appear,
On high, the clouds with mighty adumbration
Sailed over us to seaward fast and clear
And jellyfish in quivering isolation
Lay silted in the dry sand of the breeze
And we, along the table-land of beach blown
Went gooseflesh from our shoulders to our knees
And ran to catch the football, each to each thrown,
In the soft and swirling music of the seas.

There splashed about our ankles as we waded
These intersecting wavelets morning-cold,
And sudden dark a patch of sea was shaded,
And sudden light, another patch would hold
The warmth of whirling atoms in a sun-shot
And underwater sandstorm green and gold.
So in we dived and louder than a gunshot
Sea-water broke in fountains down the ear.
How cold the bathe, how chattering cold the drying,
How welcoming the inland reeds appear,
The wood-smoke and the breakfast and the frying,
And your warm freshwater ripples, Horsey Mere.


