

THE POWER OF POETRY - AUGUST



I have chosen a Welsh poet this time, R S Thomas 1913-2000. He was an Anglican priest, but also an ardent Welsh nationalist, disliking what he saw as the Anglicisation of Wales, and supporting the group of arsonists that targeted Englishowned holiday cottages (and saying what was one death, compared to the death of the whole Welsh nation). He was also a pacifist which seems

somewhat contrary to the above.

He married Mildred Eldridge, an English artist, and had one son, Gwydion (1945-2016). They had a small income and lacked modern comforts through their own choice. He learnt Welsh from the age of 30 and worked largely in a Welsh-speaking community. On retirement he and his wife moved to a small unheated cottage where the temperature was often below freezing. He became more politically active after retirement, and he rarely attended Holy Communion because of changes to the liturgy made in 1966. He couldn't bear to see the priest facing the people rather than leading the congregation towards God from the east-facing position.

Thomas had a reputation for being taciturn and difficult and photographs I have seen of him show a rather grim figure. His son said that his father's sermons often mentioned the evil of refrigerators, washing machines etc, believing that such modern appliances were a distraction from spiritual matters. This, said Gwydion, was to a congregation that did not have any of these


things "but were longing for them". [Also, I would have thought that spending most of the day doing the washing – filling the "copper" bucket by bucket, heating the water, emptying it, rinsing by hand, putting it through the mangle, hanging it on a washing line, ironing it once dry; washing coloured and delicate items by hand – didn't leave much time for thinking spiritual thoughts!] I expect we can all think of various gadgets that we think would be better for not existing, but Thomas does seem to have taken this to extremes!

Thomas, however, was asking 'what is life for?' and what is our desire for more and more 'stuff' doing to our souls? His poetry does not seem to reflect his grimness, rather his faith, and *The Bright Field* is perhaps one of his most famous poems. He does not care for rhymes, and I feel the poem could almost be written as prose.

I have seen the sun break through
to illuminate a small field
for a while, and gone my way
and forgotten it. But that was the
pearl of great price, the one field that had
treasure in it. I realise now
that I must give all that I have
to possess it. Life is not hurrying

on to a receding future, nor hankering after an imagined past. It is the turning aside like Moses to the miracle of the lit bush, to a brightness that seemed as transitory as your youth once, but is the eternity that awaits you. This poem is about those rare moments when we feel the Holy Spirit is with us or some connection to God's creation, though this need not be a religious feeling. Such moments could be on hearing a moving piece of music, or when we encounter a beautiful landscape, a meadow full of flowers, the sea....

The feelings engendered do not last and cannot be planned for. They are nearly always very fleeting and, for many, are moments when God seems very near. In Thomas's case the sun shining on a small field, seen and then forgotten, was such a moment. He knows now that the field was the "pearl of great price" and that such a rare experience should have been held on to as it signalled the presence of God; that we should turn aside, as Moses did for the burning bush, when such moments occur.



I have written above on his apparently far from sunny disposition. But his poetry gives a different aspect of his character. I therefore include another one of his, *Kneeling*, which gives perhaps an insight into his thoughts as priest.

Moments of great calm, kneeling before an altar of wood in a stone church in summer, waiting for the God to speak; the air a staircase for silence: the sun's light ringing me, as though I acted a great role. And the audiences still; all that close throng of spirits waiting, as I, for the message. Prompt me, God; but not yet. When I speak, though it be you who speak through me, something is lost. The meaning is in the waiting.


