PCC Meeting: Thursday 25 September

This is a brief summary of our discussions and decisions:

St Stephens: Frances Suttonwood was unanimously appointed Pro-Warden at St Stephen's and was co-opted to fill a casual vacancy on the Council. Verbal updates were given on the church repairs and permission for solar panels on the Village Hall

Safeguarding: Following new CofE requirements an updated safeguarding procedure was formally adopted and and both church and non-church activities were approved. In addition, Nick and Judith were appointed as "Hub Owners" for the parish's Safeguarding Hub.

Project 200: The council decided on which of two glass companies would be asked to carry out the work of enclosing the Lady Chapel to make it a warm space. There was a review of the successful 200th Anniversary weekend of events.

Finance: The Quarterly Reports and the current Restricted Funds were reviewed. How Gift Aid is allocated to the St Stephen's congregation was discussed, as was the plan to launch the Parish Giving Scheme in the new year.

Eco Church: An update highlighted the church's pledge to Green Energy and its interest in the Net Zero Pioneers programme. Getting permission from the Diocese is in progress for the solar panels on St Martin's roof and it was also agreed to progress the work towards renewing the church heating controls.

Contested Heritage: There was unanimous agreement for Christina Peake to be contracted to deliver creative workshops and draft a proposal for a piece of artwork for St Martin's.

John Chandler Hall sale update: We should hear very shortly if revised planning permission has been given and the sale to Nuro Homes can go ahead.

Director of Music: It was reported that a new job description and job advertisement is being drawn up.

Also agreed: To renew Ruth Foxcroft's Permission to Officiate, to plan First-Aid training, to seek professional valuation of six old Bibles, to seek quotes for a chancel carpet and to find ways to increase the transparency of the PCC's work by publishing draft minutes and displaying names and photos of Council members.

Eco Fair

Our fourth Eco Fair at St Martin's on Saturday 20th September had some really positive feedback:

'It is all looking good and the Eco Fair is buzzing.'
'We very much enjoyed the Eco Fair yesterday catching up with old friends making new ones and exchanging ideas It's a wonderful location and the atmosphere is warm and welcoming.' 'people were genuinely interested and not just out to buy things.' 'as it was remote (ie you had to choose to go there) it was more meaningful than having through-traffic that does not necessarily engage.'

Church offered visitors the opportunity to write to their MP (Helen Maguire in Epsom and Ewell, Rebecca Paul in Reigate and Banstead) about the Climate and Nature (CAN) Bill, decorating postcards from Green Christian to encourage them. 18 adults and four children signed on the day with an extra nine adults and one



child at church on Sunday.

All the cake went - not surprising - I noticed some people walking in through the doors and turning sharp right, straight for the refreshments!
Having things outside made the place look

'happening' and inviting: the BBQ food was very well received (with excellent chalk signs directing people to it - thanks,

Tom!). We were pleased with the balance of there being things to buy, things to sign and sign up for (supporting and campaigning) and things to find out.





Eco/green/climate/environmental work doesn't stand on its own, but links and informs - and is informed by - much of what we do; responding to need, transforming unjust structures, environmental justice, racial justice, promoting flourishing. On Saturday I saw lots of people I hadn't seen before, showing that the reach of the Fair had widened. It was one of our opportunities to show that people in church care about and are active in issues which are world issues, and that we don't necessarily reflect negative headline-grabbing stories or stereotypical portrayals seen in the media.

THANK YOU SO MUCH to ALL of you who prayed, planned, suggested, kept calm (when those around, ie me, were not!) and

welcomed people to our wonderful church!

For next year's fair we will be working with Epsom Methodist

Church and hope to go from strength to strength!


We also need you to start collecting goods for us to sell. The following are the stalls we are hoping to have:

Overflowing Faith & Generosity

A six-week study course starting Tuesday 30 September @ 7.30 pm in the Wisley Room, Church House

THE POWER OF POETRY - SEPTEMBER



T S Eliot (1888 – 1965) was an anglicised American, living much of his life in this country, and was confirmed into the Anglican Church. He wrote a variety of works, including *The Waste Land, Journey of the Magi* and *Murder in the Cathedral.*

Many of his greatest poems dealt with the issue of faith which was of central importance to him, and he wrote four very long works, *Four Quartets*. At this point I should confess that I have read very little of any of his – generally just a few short extracts, with the exception of *Journey of the Magi ("A cold coming we had of it, at the worst time of the year....")*, and *Murder in the*

Cathedral. The Four Quartets explore the nature of time and timelessness, and faith, and presumably chart Eliot's own journey of faith and his search for meaning in the face of human frailties and world events.

I am giving here two extracts, both from *Little Gidding*, the fourth and final Quartet. The first is from the beginning, the second from the end. The latter I came across in the nineties as it was a reading at the memorial service for my old headmistress. I liked it then, though I was not absolutely sure what it meant!

First though, it might be of interest to give a bit of background to the place after which this is named. Little Gidding was set up in the seventeenth century by Nicholas Ferrar (a friend of the priest and poet George Herbert). He bought a run-down manor house and turned it into a religious community, which I think comprised thirty or so members of his own family. As in a conventional religious community such as a monastery the rules were apparently strict and run on Christian principles. Among their activities was book binding, and they also practised charitable works, such as looking after the welfare of local children. Daily services were held in the chapel. King Charles I visited it, at the start of the Civil War just after the Battle of Naseby, when he was anxious about the future and, probably, terrified as well (see line 7 below). The community at Little Gidding dispersed during the Civil War but came together again later. Eliot visited Little Gidding in 1940.

But on to the first extract:

If you came this way

Taking the route you would be likely to take

From the place you would be likely to come from, If you came this way in May time, you would find the hedges White again*, in May, with voluptuary sweetness. It would be the same at the end of the journey, If you came at night like a broken king, If you came by day not knowing what you came for, It would be the same, when you leave the rough road And turn behind the pig-sty to the dull façade And the tombstone.

And what you thought you came for

And what you thought you came for Is only a shell, a husk of meaning From which the purpose breaks only when it is fulfilled If at all.

*Earlier lines dealt with winter weather with its cold and white snow. The second extract:

We shall not cease from exploration
And the end of all our exploring
Will be to arrive where we started
And know the place for the first time
Through the unknown, remembered gate
When the last of earth left to discover
Is that which was the beginning;
At the source of the longest river
The voice of the hidden waterfall
And the children in the apple-tree
Not known, because not looked for
But heard, half-heard, in the stillness
Between two waves of the sea.
Quick now, here, now, always —
A condition of complete simplicity

(Costing not less than everything)
And all shall be well and
All manner of things shall be well*
When the tongues of flame are in-folded
In the crowned knot of fire
And the fire and the rose are one.

Eliot believed that humanity's misunderstanding of life, and the turning away from God results in despair and warfare (he was writing during World War II) which could be overcome if the lessons of the past were learnt. His reference to fire, presumably the fire at Pentecost when the spirit was sent to the Apostles, was emphasising the need for purification. He thought that the unity of the past, present and future would offer salvation, when "the fire and the rose are one". Eliot's visit to Little Gidding, a place which had been a holy community of prayer, was not a sight-seeing expedition, but was about spiritual stillness, and the transformation which could arise – a "timeless" moment when God was near.

I am not sure that I have been successful in my attempt to interpret these extracts, so read them carefully, possibly the rest of the poem also. Any insights you may have will be gratefully received!
