'HERE I AM' Black History Month Exhibition at St Martin's Monday 20 October – Sunday 26 October

"Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here I am. Send me!"

Isaiah 6:8

We are delighted that *Here I Am*, the Diocese's travelling exhibition, created for Black History Month, is coming to St Martin's from Monday 20 October to Sunday 26 October. Inspired by Oxford Diocese's *Resolved to Serve* project, this exhibition showcases the lived experience, faith, and ministry of UKME clergy within the Diocese of Guildford.

It captures the spirit of willingness and response to God's call – especially as lived by those whose voices and presence have not always been seen or celebrated within the Church. Through written and recorded reflections, *Here I Am* seeks to honour the contributions of Black clergy, amplify diverse voices, and offer a platform for shared reflection, learning and celebration.

The exhibition features Revd Dr Moni Babatunde (associate minister at St Andrew's Cobham), Revd Dr Oluwapelumi Adeyemi (minister at St Francis' Church Guildford) and Revd Janet Williams (curate at St John's Stoke), as well as an interview from Beauty Adeson a member of the Church House team. The portraits are presented on large canvases and include a QR code so that you can scan and watch the full interviews. The interviews cover a range of topics including their path to ordination, dealing with imposter syndrome, their gifts and different perspectives, as well as an acceptance that attitudes are changing and diversity is improving in the diocese and the wider church.

Racial Diversity Enabler, Umair Asif says: "This exhibition is a powerful reminder of the importance of representation and seeing people who look like you in senior ministry and leadership positions. We are currently developing a vocations day in early December which will be aimed at encouraging more people from UKME/GMH backgrounds to explore their calling to ordained ministry."

Bishop Paul says in his reflection for Black History Month (https://www.cofeguildford.org.uk/about-us/news/exhibition-to-inspire-the-next-generation-of-black-church-leaders.php) 'This is an opportunity to say to all our Global Majority Heritage sisters and brothers that we love them and that we couldn't

imagine the church or its mission and ministry without them. I earnestly pray that our diversity as a diocese will continue to grow that it might increasingly reflect the Kingdom of God."

Prayer for Black History Month Compassionate God,

who sent Jesus Christ to deliver us from all manner of injustices and inequalities,

create in us new hearts and enlarged visions, to see the image of God in every person irrespective of background, race and ethnicity. May we be generous in our love of others as we work towards ending racism and injustice; creating communities of human flourishing, through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God. now and for ever. The North Aisle



Overflowing Faith & Generosity

Bishop of Manchester's recent Thought for the Day and his visit to Codrington, Barbados

Those of you who have attended our annual lectures relating to our contested memorial to John Brathwaite will know about his involvement with the Codrington Estates in Barbados. In particular, those who heard Duncan Dormer (General Secretary of the United Society Partners in the Gospel) speak last year will know about USPG's Renewal and Reconciliation Project which seeks "to engage critically with and act in response to USPG's shameful links to slavery through its ownership of the Codrington Estates in Barbados" (USPG's words, quoted from https://uspg.org.uk/codrington-project/).

As we continue to reflect on our contested heritage and work towards the creation of a new memorial to the enslaved, you may be interested to hear the Bishop of Manchester's *Thought for the Day* which aired on Radio 4 on Monday 13 October https://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/p0m8b00p

For those who can't easily access the internet, here is a transcript of what the Right Rev Dr David Walker, Bishop of Manchester said:

"Good morning. On a day when events in Israel and Gaza dominate the headlines, I'll be boarding a flight from London to Barbados, heading for Codrington College, the site where the Anglican Mission Agency I now chair inherited and ran a sugar plantation with enslaved labour for over 100 years. The burial places of those whose often short and brutal lives ended at Codrington were noted neither on plans nor on the ground. We think, however, in these last few weeks we may have found some of them, ironically like King Richard III, beneath the car park. Finding a mark in the graves is one small part of a much wider programme. Our aim is to recognise and respond to the legacy of enslavement in ways that will build a better future for the descendants of those who produced the sugar that returned so much wealth to Britain three centuries ago. At the heart of it lies the task of learning to tell history, not simply from the perspective of the rich and powerful, but from the actual experiences of ordinary people. Black History Month, which reaches its midpoint this week, adds a particular energy to that task. At the height of the American Civil War, Confederate envoys based in Liverpool sought to bring Britain into the conflict on the side of the south.

arguing that the UK's primary interest lay in protecting the cotton trade. Famously, Manchester's weavers refused to handle the slavery-produced cotton they supplied, even at the cost of their own employment. The US President himself wrote a letter of thanks, and today his statue stands in the city centre, in a spot appropriately named Lincoln Square.

Telling the story of slavery is for me not just an exercise in history, but also a theological imperative. The Christian gospel compels me to recognize the intrinsic worth of every individual. Christ died, not just for the sake of a fortunate few, but for the whole of humanity. When the story of what's happened in Gaza and Israel these last two years finds its way into the history books, I believe it must not just be the story of clashing ideologies and geopolitical forces, but centre on the experiences of those massacred by terrorists, or held as hostage, or starved, or killed in bombed-out buildings, and of all who survived but bear the scars. Alongside this, recovering the memory of enslaved people buried beneath a Barbadian car park long ago, may seem less compelling. But it is by remembering and re-telling all the stories of human beings at the heart of them that I hope a journey to a better future in Barbados, the Middle East, and for all of us, can be made."

THE POWER OF POETRY - OCTOBER

This month's choice is quite seasonal, but it is also lengthy so I haven't written much in the way of commentary. It is a light offering from John Betjeman: *The Church Mouse.* We have recently celebrated harvest, though this is a festival probably best suited to a country village. Tins and packets of food do not have the same visual appeal as a sheaf of corn, or home grown fruit and

vegetables. Still, we *do* have mice (or did have earlier in the year when they caused chaos in the biscuit cupboard – but don't panic, they have been dealt with, and the biscuits are now safely in tins. Plastic containers evidently offer no defence against the teeth of rodents!).

I spoke about Betjeman in August 2024 when the chosen poem was *Hymn*, so to save space I won't offer any biographical notes this time. All I shall say is that the last few lines are ironic. We don't know anyone like that of course.

Here among long-discarded cassocks. Damp stools, and half-split open hassocks, Here where the vicar never looks I nibble through old service books. Lean and alone I spend my days Behind this Church of England baize. I share my dark forgotten room With two oil lamps and half a broom. The cleaner never bothers me So here I eat my frugal tea. My bread is sawdust mixed with straw. My jam is polish for the floor. Christmas and Easter may be feasts For congregations and for priests, And so may Whitsun. All the same. They do not fill my meagre frame. For me the only feast at all Is Autumn's Harvest festival. When I can satisfy my want With ears of corn around the font

I climb the eagle's brazen head To burrow through a loaf of bread. I scramble up the pulpit stair And gnaw the marrows hanging there. It is enjoyable to taste These items ere they go to waste, But how annoying when one finds That other mice with pagan minds Come into church my food to share Who have no proper business there. Two field mice who have no desire To be baptized, invade the choir. A large and most unfriendly rat Comes in to see what we are at. He says he thinks there is no God And yet he comes... it's rather odd. This year he stole a sheaf of wheat (it screened our special preacher's seat), And prosperous mice from fields away Come in to hear our organ play, And under cover of its notes Ate through the altar's sheaf of oats.

A low church mouse who thinks that I
Am too papistical, and High,
Yet somehow doesn't think it wrong
To munch through Harvest Evensong.
While I, who starve the whole year through,
Must share my food with rodents who
Except that at this time of year
Not once inside the church appear.

Within the human world I know
Such goings-on could not be so.
For human beings only do
What their religion tells them to.
They read the Bible every day
And always, night and morning, pray.
And just like me, the good church mouse,
Worship each week in God's house.
But all the same it's strange to me
How very full the church can be
With people I don't see at all
Except at Harvest Festival.
